Read Matthew 28:16–20

This passage of Scripture is known as The Great Commission. A commission is a duty or command given to a group of people. Jesus was giving the disciples the greatest mission they would ever have: to tell the world about Him, His teachings, and how He came to save the world.

The Great Commission is an important passage to memorize because the command Jesus gave applies to

us today as well. Jesus came for the whole world, and He wants everyone to know about Him.

Who taught you to live like Jesus?

Who taught you about Jesus? It's probably more than one person. Maybe a parent or grandparent? Or a neighbor who invited you to church? Write as many names as you can think of:

Beside each name, make a note about when and how you can reach out to that person to thank them for teaching you to live like Jesus. Starting today, call or find one of the people on your list and tell them how you're thankful for how they taught you to live like Jesus. Continue each day until you've talked to everyone on your list!

Think back to the list you made yesterday of people who taught you to live like Jesus. Just like they taught you about Jesus, you can teach others too. That's how we teach one another—sharing what we've learned with others.

Now think forward: how can you pass on what you've learned to others? Make a "lesson plan" like a teacher would. Write LESSON PLAN at the top of a sheet of paper. In the middle of the paper, write what you want to teach (such as, how God sent Jesus to be our Savior,

or how you can be courageous when you know God is with you), who you want to teach (this could be peers, siblings, or little kids at church), and how you want to teach them (like inviting them to church, sharing your own faith testimony, or helping lead a preschool class at church).

Also include a list of people who you want to learn from. These might be the same people who you thanked earlier this week, or it could be someone new. It might be someone you've always admired for their faith. As you put your lesson plan into action, reach out to these people and ask them to teach you what they know as well.

Lastly, decorate your lesson plan however you'd like. You can keep it simple in black and white or add lots of color and stickers. Then hang your lesson plan somewhere in your bedroom so you can remember what you've planned and continue to **teach one another.**
